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DIRECTOR'S CORNER Rob Younger, OACA Executive Director



As I reflect on my fifty years in the coaching profession, I realize how truly blessed I have been to be associated and influenced by so many outstanding individuals: coaches, student/athletes, support staff, officials and parents. What has become clear is that coaching is not an easy assignment. It is not for the faint-hearted. It is for those with courage, ethics, conviction and skill. The best coaches have the most to share with others. The following "Food For Thought" comes from studying those who have influenced me over those fifty years. Each is unique and designed to present a memorable thought to help you in your development as a coach and as a person. They can be applied to all sports, all levels of competition, and all levels of experience.

- 1. Coaching is seldom fair. Work on the things you can control. Gracefully accept the rest.
- 2. Coaching demands a high ethical standard. Your actions must be above reproach. Don't give a reason to have your motives questioned.
- 3. Each day of work is an audition. Look the part in your dress, demeanor and discipline. You only have once to make a first impression.
- 4. Impersonation doesn't work! You coach who you are. By the way, who are YOU?
- 5. 80% of coaching is managing people. Being superior at the remaining 20% won't cut it. Learn the art of influencing people and the science of its application.
- 6. Criticism comes with the territory. Plan on it!
- 7. Participant safety is a primary responsibility. Your Practice and Game decisions should always err on the side of safety.
- 8. Bad body language will silence good words. Learn how to deliver the message, especially when they won't like what you have to say.
- 9. I heard you twice the first time. Be clear, concise and coherent. Minimize the chance of misinterpretation.
- 10. Good Coaches learn to be good listeners. Listen to Learn!
- 11. It takes extraordinary restraint to get the job done. Learn to use your emotions and focus to bring calm out of chaos.
- 12. Mistakes are made and we as coaches make them most days. If you make one, make it for the right reason and if you clearly make one, own up.
- 13. Pour no gasoline! You are prohibited from making things worse.
- 14. It takes a support team to reach higher levels. Remember where you came from and who broke the trail for you.
- 15. Never let the pressure of competition overcome the pleasure of competition. Have Fun! Don't ever let things get so serious that enjoyment cannot be expressed and sincerely humorous situations can't be enjoyed.

We celebrate our great profession because we know its importance and have countless examples of how coaches continue to change the lives of the young people we come in contact with on a daily basis.

OACA Liability Insurance Info:

The liability coverage policy period is August 1 – July 31 and is activated as soon as you receive your membership card. It covers the coach during their season, off-season workouts, and during summer activities. College and Youth Coaches are not covered by the Liability Insurance policy - the policy only covers High School and Middle School Coaches. As a 2023-24 OACA Member, you were covered during this past summer's activities. After July 31, our new membership year began, and you will need to sign up again to be covered Aug. 1st, 2024-July 31st, 2025.

Every year the OSAA publishes each sports plan book for that year with all pertinent rules. Any new or updated rules are addressed at the beginning of the book and every now and again those rules directly impact your athletic trainer or staff that may have to assist in injury situations. For example, this year rules 3-3-6 & 3-3-7 for basketball (see link below for official rules) have changed for when a player will be removed from play as well as a time frame for blood clean up on a jersey or player.

2024-2025 OACA Scholarship Information

The OACA has annually awarded eight \$1,000 student-athlete scholarships to high school graduating children and grandchildren of OACA members. **New for 2024-25**, **we will be increasing that amount to eight \$2,000 student-athlete scholarships.** Scholarship applications are reviewed by the OACA Executive Board, who evaluate applications in the areas of academics, athletic participation and honors, extracurricular activities, and community service.

In addition to the eight \$2,000 student-athlete scholarships, The **Coach Dave Johnson Scholarship** is awarded to a college-bound student-athlete who has overcome obstacles in their personal life in order to reach a level of success, both on and off the field of play, that makes them a credit to their team, school and community. This scholarship is sponsored by Dave Dowling, South Salem HS graduate, in honor of Coach Johnson's meaningful impact on his life as a young student-athlete.

Additionally, the OACA, along with support from Jennifer and Jerod Teeter, created the **OACA Directors and Presidents Scholarship** for coaches to recognize a deserving senior student-athlete. This scholarship is sponsored by former OACA directors and presidents who desire to "give back" in appreciation of the OACA. Please note that this scholarship is nomination-based, and we invite our members to nominate a deserving student-athlete who meets the following criteria:

- Outstanding character, sportsmanship and leadership—a student-athlete who truly stands out among peers

- Emphasis given to multi-sport athlete

What an exciting Fall to be an Oregonian and someone who loves administrating, coaching, officiating, participating in or watching athletic competitions. The Fall high school sport seasons have concluded and everyone is prepping for the first competitions of the Winter 2024-25 seasons.

As is usual during the year there are a number of key athletic issues being proposed, discussed and decided at the state level. It is the opportunity for all coaches of our 295 schools, representing six classifications, to stand up and be heard during these discussions. Even though unanimity is rarely achieved on a decision, being a part of the process affords coaches and ADs from the smallest to the largest school to have a voice and express their opinion on important issues facing the OSAA and our member schools. Please read, connect with others and be knowledgeable about the issues and initiatives being discussed. Then, share your opinion with your athletic director throughout the process to the final decision. There is also a new form OSAA has created on their website that allows anyone to propose a 'rule change'.

The OADA Executive Board is hard at work planning another outstanding state conference next April in Sunriver. ADs from all member schools will gather to take classes and attend workshops. Many ADs will also connect with other schools to discuss and potentially finalize S.O.P.s and sport schedules.

The OADA Hall of Fame Committee, lead by Mike Henderson, has selected the 15th class into the OADA Hall of Fame. Inductees include Mark Horak, CAA formerly of Lakeridge HS, Dennis Burke, formerly of Wilsonville HS, Vicki Nelms, CMAA, formerly of Nelson HS and Del LaRue formerly of McMinnville HS. We are very excited to celebrate the induction of these special athletic administrators during the annual Conference Banquet Monday evening, April 14 in Sunriver. 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Oregon School Activities Association

From all of us at the OSAA we want to congratulate those wrapping up their fall seasons and welcome those who are starting out on their winter seasons. We appreciate all that you do.

Outside of championships the OSAA is working with a couple of committees that will help shape the future of Oregon high school activities. One is the Championship Thresholds Task Force. This group was created at the request of the Executive Board after receiving feedback from the previous State Championship Committee. The State Championship Committee felt that their condensed timeframe made it difficult to delve into the intricacies of the qualifying percentages of each sport and activity.

The Task Force is reviewing all qualification procedures and percentages for all sports and activities within the Association. At their most recent meeting, the Task Force had an in-depth conversation about qualifications and their philosophy on what a state championship means to them. At this current time, the Task Force feels too many teams or students are qualifying for many state championship events. In some cases, well over 50% of participants in a given activity are making it to the championship and the Task Force believes that is too many. The group believes it should be difficult to make it to a state championship, hence heightening the memories for those involved.

The group feels that a reduction in participation has additional qualities. A change would help reduce some lopsided matchups that happen in the opening rounds of the playoffs, help increase academic seat time for students, decrease the overlap between seasons hence helping multi-sport athletes get the rest or practice needed before heading into the next season, and lowers the costs for districts who have teams traveling significant distances to play.

The group is not solely focused on reduction but is supportive of expansion where needed. The group believes that Tennis needs to be reviewed by the State Championship Committee as they average the lowest participation across all sports (11%-17% of participants make it to state). In addition, the group supports the review of 3A/2A/1A Girls Cross Country, 4A/3A/2A/1A Girls Golf

and 3A/2A/1A Soccer where additional championships could be provided due to increased participation by schools. Overall, the Task Force's philosophy is that getting to a state championship bracket or event is an honor.

Les Schwab Invitational Presented by Express Employment Professionals
Celebrates 28 Years with New Location

The Les Schwab Invitational, presented by Express Employment Professionals, will mark its 28th year as one of the nation's premier high school basketball tournaments. For the first time, the event will be hosted at Portland State University, running from December 26 to December 30, 2024. Known for featuring future college and NBA stars, this year's tournament includes top out-of-state teams such as Gonzaga Prep Purple Eagles (Washington, D.C.), La Lumiere Lakers (La Porte, Indiana), Owyhee Storm (Meridian, Idaho), and Rainier Beach Vikings (Seattle, Washington). Standout players include La Lumiere's Jalen Haralson (#10, Notre Dame commit), Darius Adams (#19, UCONN commit), and Chuck Love (#96, Loyola Chicago commit), alongside Gonzaga Prep's Nyk Lewis (#52, Xavier commit) and Derek Dixon (#51, North Carolina commit).

Oregon's top high school players are also well-represented. Central Catholic features Isaac Carr (#1 in Oregon, Wake Forest commit) and Duce Paschal (#7, Weber State commit), along with Zamir Paschal, the #1 player in the class of 2026. Barlow's Brayden Barron (#3, Portland State commit) will team up with Jalen Atkins, the #4 player in the state. Jesuit adds depth with Patrick Kilfoil (#10 in Oregon) and Isaac Bongen, the #1 player in the class of 2027. These local standouts will compete alongside other Oregon schools, including Baker, Barlow, Camas, Grant, Jesuit, Lakeridge, Mountainside, Nelson, Roosevelt, Southridge, and Westview.

As the tournament celebrates nearly three decades of excellence, its move to Portland State University signals an exciting new chapter. Fans can expect five days of electrifying basketball, with nationally ranked teams and top local talent showcasing their skills. The Les Schwab Invitational remains a cornerstone event for basketball enthusiasts, promising unforgettable matchups and a glimpse into the future of the sport.

Helping Kids Budget with Oregon State Credit Union®

Winter is a wonderful time for reflection and shared motivation to try to make next year even better than the last. This time of year, we have many members at Oregon State Credit Union connecting with our Financial Services Consultants for advice about how to start or improve a budgeting system or teach children in their lives the basics of managing money.

Here are some tips to get kids in your life started on making a plan for money:

Save, spend, give:

Giving younger kids a "rule" about how much of their money they should save, spend, and give is one of the best ways to start the money. For example, saying that for every dollar you get, 25 cents goes to savings, 50 cents goes to spending, and 25 cents goes to giving. The numbers are up to you, but having a rule of thumb is a great place to start getting kids practicing healthy money habits!

Here are some discussion questions to help start the conversation:

- Save: Tell me about a time you/our family saved up for something big. How did it make you feel?
- Spend: What is your favorite store and what do you like to buy with you spending money?
- Give: What problems in the world do you want to help fix? How can we use our time or money to help with this problem?

Teens: A good place to start for teens is 50/30/20 budgeting. 50% of their money goes to "needs," like their cell phone bill, car insurance, or other things for which they are responsible. 30% goes towards "wants," like coffee out with their friends or future fun goals like a concert or event. 20% goes towards "savings," which can include a fun goal but should also address the concept of emergency funds. Here is a great way to introduce this idea to teens from our financial education resource center: The 50/30/20 Rule for Teens
